RECIPES From the Cookbooks of Sioux County Women

MASHED POTATOES WITH PIMENTOS Mrs. Harry Dykstra 2 cups hot rice potatoes 2 tbsp. butter 1/3 cup milk 1 tsp. salt 2 pimentoes 1 onion Method: To the hot potatoes add the butter, milk and salt and beat well. Rub the pimentoes through a strainer, mince the onion and add to the potatoes. Serve at once.

LEFTOVER MEAT DISH Mrs. Harry Dykstra 1/2 or 3/4 pkg. macaroni cooked and drained 1 chopped onion 1 cup tomatoes 1 cup diced cold roast beef or pot roast 1 or 2 bay leaves 3 or 4 cloves 1/4 lb. cream cheese, cut up Method: Mix all this together and bake 1/2 hour or so in buttered casserole.

PINEAPPLE CAKE Mrs. Harry Dykstra 1/2 cup butter 1 1/2 cup sugar 1 tsp vanilla 1 cup crushed pineapple 2 1/2 cups Omap flour 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder 1/8 tsp. salt 1/4 cup water 3 egg whites Method: Cream the butter, add sugar and cream again. Add the vanilla and crushed pineapple, then a portion of the flour. Take out part of flour and sift with the baking powder and save that until last. Add the water and the 2 cups of our alternately and beat only until smooth. Fold in the beaten egg whites, beaten stiff together. Place in two 8-inch pans. Paper in the pan is a good idea because the fruit may cause the cake to break. Bake in a moderate oven.

Here is the correct version of this recipe given last week. GRAPENUT PUDDING Miss Marie Muilenburg 1/2 cup grapenuts. Pour over it 1 cup boiling water. Let cool. 1/2 cup dates 1/2 cup sugar 1 tablespoon butter 1/2 cup nuts 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 2 eggs beaten separately Method: Mix all and fold in the whites of eggs last. Bake 3/4 hour in moderate oven. Serve with hard sauce or whipped cream.
