## NEIGHBORING COUNTIES

Ireton is already making plans for a Fourth of July celebration.  
Rock Valley will have an automobile institution, April 30th, May 1st and 2nd.  
The Orange City school board considers abandoning their high school on account of decreasing attendance.  
Algona let a contract last week for asphaltic concrete paving at 1.53 a square yard. The same kind of paving was put in last year in Algona.  
Rock Rapids is to have electroliter posts made of cement. The posts, without fixtures or installation, cost \$10 each.  
Rev. A. J. Patterson, of Hamburg, Iowa, at the age of 73 years has taken a wife. Mrs. Sarah Crum, of Pierson, Iowa, age 70 years, is the fortunate bride.  
The Alton town council has raised the price of gas from \$1.25 to \$2.00 a thousand. The Democrat thinks that leaky mains are the principal cause of the disparity between the receipts and expenses of the gas plant.  
Iowa Falls has adopted the city manager plan. E. L. Marriage, county auditor of Hardin county, has resigned to accept the position at a salary of \$1,500 per year with the promise of an increase the second year.  
The state board of control has re-appointed Charles C. Horton, commandant of the Iowa Soldiers' home at Marshalltown, and M. N. Voldeng, superintendent of the Cherokee State Hospital for the Insane for a period of four years each.  
The city council at Carroll has adopted a resolution to pave fifteen blocks during the year 1914. The Herald is a large one. Joe Kingly is 51 years old, kinds of paving, though it is not likely that the council will contract for anything but brick.  
The town council of Paulina at the annual meeting last week increased the tax levy from 19 to 36 1/2 mills. Public improvements that people demanded are the principal reason for the increased levy. With the public as well as individuals it takes money to pay for improved living conditions.  
Mr. and Mrs. David VanderHam, residing two miles east of Chatsworth, were called upon Tuesday evening to mourn the death of their seven-year-old daughter, Margaret, from scarlet fever. Owing to the fact that their home is still under quarantine, no public funeral could be held.  
A short campaign for new members to the Commercial club at Red Oak has added one hundred forty-five new names to the list. One hundred nineteen were secured in one day and the whistle on the electric light plant was blown each time a new member was secured. The active membership totals 235.  
E. H. Cunningham, speaker of the house in the last legislature, and for three terms representative from the county of Buena Vista, has announced that he will not be a candidate again for renomination. He will engage in a business with his brother in Des Moines. There are already two announced candidates for the nomination, W. C. Edson, of Storm Lake, and Guy Roberts, of Marathon.  
The Joe Hain farm in O'Brien county, known all over northwest Iowa as one of the few remaining "big farms," is to be divided and sold. There is a solid section of it with a quarter section adjoining on the north. As there is no road between these two pieces it makes a tract of 800 acres in one piece. The buildings, the largest in this part of the state, are located in the center of the section, its highest point, and command a view of every foot of the farm. They are valued at about \$15,000.  
The Sioux county supervisors let contracts last week for thirty bridges and culverts. There were eight bidders and real competition existed. Four of the bids were by outside firms and four by local people. Bids for the entire work ranged from \$19,000 to \$25,000, the lowest figure being submitted by a Des Moines concern. On the smaller work the local people were away below the big companies. Delbert Wheeler, of Ireton, was the lowest bidder on two of the larger jobs and submitted a bid with alternative plan on two of the large concrete bridges that will save the county \$2,500 if his plans are approved by the highway commission.
