The other project which extends from Sioux City north through Hinton calls for 557,147 yards of excavation, 1,276 feet of concrete culverts, 3,960 yards of surfacing on detour This project has nine concrete slab on concrete pile culverts, ten 24x30 reinforced concrete slab bridges, one temporary 32x20 foot I-beam bridge and widening two I-beam bridges and one 32x24 skew I-beam bridge.

At the same letting bids will paving on Nos. 3 and 75 in LeMars near their intersection. Bids were asked once before for this praject but none were submitted. One of these projects calls for widening the Plymouth street paving for a distance of .226 of a mile. The specifications call for removal of old paving, walks and drives, 1,290 yards of concrete paving, 185 feet of drives and walks, three manholes and 1,374 feet of storm sewer. The other project calls for wid-

ening No. 75 north from the same intersection on Fifth Street, S. W. and .456 miles of pavement widenand drives, 1,365 yards of excavation, 2,373 yards of concrete pavement and 678 feet of storm sewer. These LeMars projects are to be paid for from funds allocated by the state to the city last year.
